The Speaker: Frank A. Bensley

Frank Bensley is the principal at Bensley Consulting, located in Westfield, Illinois. He is a senior member of ASQ and former Chairman of Section 1209. Frank is an ASQ certified auditor and engineer. Frank has worked with industry over a wide range of quality system topics with particular expertise in ISO 9000 implementation and documentation. Mr. Bensley has a lead auditor certificate of competence traceable to the registration board of IQA and has instructed certification classes in the CQT, CQA and CQE bodies of knowledge.

Frank's consulting work often becomes involved with management and leadership. He uses his experience in the Korean War to develop this presentation on leadership. Frank served with three units while in Korea, the 300th Armored Field Artillery, and both the 38th and 39th Field Artillery. The outstanding leader of the Korean War was Lewis B. (Chesty) Puller the most decorated Marine of all time. Some of Chesty's wisdom on leadership is presented in this discussion.

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The Program: Chesty Puller's Rules of Success



Chesty Puller enlisted in the Marine Corps in 1918 at the age of 20. He chased bandits in Haiti and Nicaragua. He commanded the Horse Marines in Peking as Commander of the 2nd Btn 4th Marines. In W.W.II he battled his way from Island to Island in the Pacific. He led his Marines at the Landing at Inchon as well as one of the most Savage rearguard actions of the Korean War; The Battle of the Chosin Reservoir.

By the time he retired from the Corps in 1951 he had earned more awards than any Marine in history: five Navy Crosses, the Distinguished Service Cross, the Silver Star, two Legions of Merit with "V" device, the Bronze Star with "V" device, the Bronze Star, the Air Medal and the Purple Heart. "Chesty" Puller became more than a hero: he was an American Legend. His gruff, give 'em hell attitude was admired throughout the Marine Corps. His bravery and his nickname, were known to the millions of Americans on the home front. He was a man's man, a Marine's Marine.
